The Seeds are Sown

One day in June 1973, Gordon Brownbill - a member of Warrington Y.M.C.A. Chess Club - opened his Warrington Guardian. On the Culcheth page he read that Richard Furness - a member of Eccles Chess Club in the Manchester and District Chess League - hoped to form a chess club in Culcheth. A quick telephone call followed and within the hour Gordon and Richard were meeting and the plans for Culcheth Chess Club were hatched!

Notices were placed in local newsagents and the names of prospective members trickled in. The aim was to hold an inaugural meeting in early September with a view to entering a team in the Warrington and District League for the 1973-74 season. The opening meeting was arranged for Thursday 13th September. Four days before this the Warrington League Annual General Meeting was held and although the club had not then been formed, Richard and Gordon gambled and entered a team which was placed in the lowest of the League's three divisions.

The Inaugural Meeting

This was held at the Pack Horse Inn, Church Lane and was attended by the following thirteen interested persons: G Adamson, G H Brownbill, J T Cammish, Mr. & Mrs. Clemson, R A Furness, E Grimshaw, R Hill, J L Hogan, A C Mackenzie, Dr. J Perkins, R Sargent and K Seddon.

Gordon Brownbill and Richard Furness jointly chaired the meeting and outlined the activities the club might offer. The match programme would consist of twelve matches in Division 3 of the Warrington and District League and a team had also been entered in the Peninsula Cup — a handicap knockout competition in which Culcheth, as a Division 3 team, would receive 1½ points start against a Division 2 team and 2½ points start against a Division 1 team.

It was agreed that Richard and Gordon should run the club until an Extraordinary General Meeting was held about December when a full complement of officers would be appointed. It was also agreed to fix a part-season subscription of £1 (Juniors and Pensioners 25p), Richard Furness offered to loan the club sets, boards and clocks until such time as the club was sufficiently established and financially capable of purchasing its own equipment. The club venue posed some problems. Thursday seemed to be the most convenient night but the room at the Pack Horse was not always available. Alternative accommodation was to be sought, but the club would again meet at the Pack Horse on the 20th. The meeting closed at 9 p.m. and those present then proceeded to play some friendly games.

The Prospects

The evidence of the club's first three meetings was that quite a strong team could be assembled. The strongest player - Dr. I Perkins - was a former President of Manchester Chess Club during which time he had a grading of around 180. Richard Furness and Gordon Brownbill were graded 155 and 137 respectively. Fifteen-year-old Alan Mackenzie had some competitive experience at Bolton School and only two months previously had been joint winner of the Minor Tournament at the Manchester Congress where he had scored 5½ out of 6. Yet another member - Bill Harper - had some experience, being a former member of the now defunct Daten Club chess section. At the League A.G.M., Warrington officials had been predicting success for Culcheth simply on the strength of the Furness-Brownbill duo! If only they had known our hidden resources!

The Opening Match

For the opening match the club was in its attractive new premises at Newchurch Primary School. For this, thanks were due to one of our members John L Hogan, his wife - a teacher at the school, and also to Mr Mackinson the headmaster.

four games were closely! contested. Bill Harper had to withstand a strong king's-side attack but repulsed it to win and take the score to 3 - 0. Richard took advantage of a middle-game error and also scored the full point, but R Sargett got into difficulties in an awkward ending and lost. On board 1 Dr Perkins went into a rook and pawns ending a pawn down. His opponent battled on against accurated defence until 11.15 p.m. before accepting the draw when getting tied-up himself.

First Team

The opening league encounter was the following evening at Appleton Thorn Prison. For this match Culcheth left out the top three players of the previous evening and introduced a further three members to competitive chess. For the first time ever, the prison team defaulted a board when one player failed to turn up and could not be found! It took only about ninety minutes for Culcheth to win every game.

The next league match was a home fixture against Warrington Railway 2nd. The club had now been considerably strengthened by the arrival of the Cheshire Chess Association secretary Peter Clamens, graded 152. He and the other debutants, Graham Connor (a Leigh Grammar School pupil) and I T Cammish, won their games and the match was won 5 - 1 without loss of a game.

A cup match with Warrington Y.M.C.A. 2nd provided another 5-1 victory without recourse to the entitled $1\frac{1}{2}$ points handicap. Y.M.C.A. went on to win the Division 2 title! Yet another 5-1 win, this time against Boteler Grammar School 2nd, indicated that the team was going to walk away with the league title. When Daresbury (later to win the Division 1 championship without loss!) were beaten $3\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}-$ or $6-2\frac{1}{2}$ with the handicap points - Culcheth moved into the Peninsula Cup semi-final and a cup and league double began to look a distinct prospect. The Daresbury match saw a successful first team debut for another Bolton School pupil - 13-year-old Jonathon Leigh.

The team continued to overwhelm all opposition, winning its remaining league matches 6-0 and 6-0 v Halton D, 5-1 and $5\frac{1}{2}$ v Rank Xerox, 6-0 and 4-2 v Culcheth 2nd, $4\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ v Boteler 2nd, 6-0 v Railway 2nd and 6-0 v Appleton Thorn. The league record for the season was :-

Played 12 Won 12 Points For 65 Points Against 7 !

The team finished six points ahead of its nearest rivals.

In the Peninsula Cup semi-final Irlam were beaten 4-2. We lost 1-2 on the top boards, but scored 3-0 on the bottom three. In the final we faced Warrington y.M.C.A., the cup-holders and the previous year's league champions. Again we went down 1-2 on the top boards but scored enough on the bottom three $(2\frac{1}{4}-\frac{1}{4})$ to edge through without needing the handicap. Richard's loss was his first for the club (previously P13 W10 D3). We thus completed the Cup and Division 3 double.

Second Team

When during October, one of the Division 3 teams withdrew, the club decided to take advantage of the opportunity to give competitive play to more members, to form a second team and ask to be allowed to take over the vacant place.

The first fixture was a 5-1 victory over Rank Xerox and our successful team was: - X Chadwick, J C Leigh, § A Flook, B Bray, E Grimshaw and J L Hogan. Bill Harper was the non-playing captain. Comfortable victories against Appleton Thorn (4½-1½) and Railway B (4-2) were followed by the internal fixture against the first team and a 0-6 reverse. Two more victories at the expense of Rank Xerox and Halton D (both 4-2) put the team second in the league, but then came a poor result against Boteler B when we could muster only 4 draws. Once again there came two wins (4-2 v Appleton Thorn and 3½-2½ revenge against Boteler B) before the return match with the first team. This proved to be a much closer encounter than before and for the first time in a league match the first team lost two games before winning by 4-2. The two victorious second team players were 16-year-old Ian Dutton (who ended J C Leigh's unbeaten run of 12 games in first and second teams) and an 11-year-old debutant Alan Beardsworth. The season ended with 5-1 and 6-0 victories against Railway B and Halton D.

The season began with the club optimistic that the First Team would give a good account of itself in Division 1, but that the Second Team - if it continued to give competitive games to as many members as possible might find things difficult in Division 2. The club's top four players were named as Dr J Perkins, Richard Furness (grading 155), Rlan Mackenzie (155) and Peter Clemens (155 also!). These were ineligible for the Second Team. Gordon Brownbill (145) and Johnathan Leigh were the remaining regulars from the previous season, but Ian Dutton was challenging hard for the last place. With Graham Connor now at Keele University, the strongest available Second Team looked likely to be Brownbill, Leigh, Dutton, Harper, Towers and Grimshaw.

First Team

Once again the season began with a Peninsula Cup match against Allied Breweries. This time we were drawn away and this time we were giving away the $1\frac{1}{2}$ points handicap. Nothing less than a 4-2 victory would do. Unfortunately we were without Dr. J. P. and Peter Clemens. Midway through the evening our chances looked slim, but we recovered so that at adjournment we held a 3-1 lead. Ian Dutton's game seemed unlikely to yield more than a draw and on board one Richard seemed to have a shaky position. Lots of analysis went into these games. Ian soon got his draw and Richard slowly got on top and could probably have gone on to win, but took the safe draw by repetition to give the necessary 4-2 (4-31 with handicap) victory.

Our first Division 1 fixture was a match at Frodsham. Peter returned to the team at the expense of Johnathan who was unable to play in many away matches. Gordon scored his eleventh successive First Team victory but Alan Mackenzie went wrong in a rook and pawns ending and lost to end his eleven-game winning run (his first 11 games for the First Team !). Richard fought back after an elementary opening blunder and, with the score 3-2, almost swindled a draw by perpetual check - but not quite. Result 3-3. The following game was played at board five.

(a) The French Defence isn't my style - it's just that I was looking around for a reasonable answer to 1 e4:

(b) This was it - the French-Benoni, a favourite at one time of the Danish grandmasier Bent Larsen, renowned for his wild but interesting play. White's best reply is probably 3 d5. I once had this played against me

and got a fraw only after some hair-raising play. This game is no exception. (c) To develop the black queen's bishop. Jalso hoped to be able to transpose

to another "wild and woolly" favourite line of mine, the Katalimov Variation of the Sicilian (1 e4 c5; 2 Nf3 b6; 3 c3 e6). My opponent has other ideas.

(d) To prevent the black queen's pawn becoming backward if white should

play 5 e5.

(e) Otherwise after 5. Bb7, an eventual Bb5 by white might cause problems. It seems a pity to move a piece in such an original/crazy position (delete whichever is inapplicable).

(f) White has a very good position, but he is a wild player and was already watching f7. He soon runs out of a plan other than the sacrifice on that

square.

(g) 8. d5 allows him more play with the threat of f5.

(h) 9. Ne7 only allows 10. Ba5 which, though it does not really threaten anything, piles on more pressure whilst developing a piece.

(i) White weakens a diagonal which my queen's bishop already occupies. 10. Be3

seems natural and as good as in more normal French lines.

(j) Making his intentions relatantly obvious.

(k) With counterattack already planned, since my opponent seemed to be opening

lines for me, e.g. h1-a8.

(1) The sacrifice must be unsound. After 12. ... Kf7; 13 Qh5+ Kg8; (13. ... g6 is hopeless after 14 Ng6) 14 Ng6 Ng6; 15 Bg6 I lose by Bf7+ and Qg6++, though here again 15. ... Be7 looks comparatively safe. However even after 14. ... Rh7; 15 Ne7+ Be7; 16 Bh7+ Kh7 white's attack is dissipated and black is a piece to a pawn up with a simple win after 16. ... Rf8 and Now if 13 Of3, probably his best move, there cames 13. Ne5, when

14 Bet fails simply to Nf3+.

(m) Levelling the material situation, but material is now irrelevant.

(n) 15 Ket is necessary, when black replies 15 0-0-0. Now 15. Nd5+ wins but I overpooked it in my haste. White must not be allowed to play 15. Qg3+??; 16 Rf3+ winning for white.

(o) The white queen is lost because of the black queen's bishop. This game

could be said to have been played on the h8-a1 diagonal. Rotes by I R Dutton.

Yet another away match followed and the same six players -Furness, Mackenzie, Clemens, Brownbill, Ducton, Harper - went to play Halton B. The team put up a much more solid performance, winning by 42-12. The draw came from Gordon whose eleven-game winning run came to an end (9 of these were in Division 3 the season before). The following game was played at board one in this match.

The nest match was at home to Y.M.C.A. B. For this we were in our new club room at the Methodist Church (for about six months we had been meeting at the Youth Centre in Church Lane) and were represented by what became our first choice team (Perkins, Furness, Mackenzie, Clemens, Brownbill and Dutton). We celebrated in style by recording a 6-0 scoreline which was repeated two weeks later in a cup match against third division Rank Xerox.

Irlam were our next league visitors (victims). Ian Dutton lost for the first time (previously P8 W7 D1 L0) but our team remained solid, all our white men won and the result was 4-2 in our favour. This game was played at board three.

At this point in the season we felt confident of beating all opposition at home, but the extent of our success would be determined by our ability to take some points from away matches against Daresbury, Halton A, Railway and Y.M.C.A. The first of these difficult fixtures now loomed before us. Daresbury had not iost any of their 14 matches in becoming league champions the previous year and their strength was based entirely upon three good players - Bailey, Winbow and Storrow. Being without Dr Perkins we defaulted on board 1, hoping to score heavily on the bottom three boards and to scrape a draw on either board 2 or 3. The plan worked. Alan had an excellent win against Storrow, Peter and Ian also won and Gordon got a draw. The least said about the other game the better. Result $3\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}$. This was also our winning score in the next match against Railway. The possibility of us being serious contenders for the championship began to be considered. At this stage we were second in the league, just a point behing Halton A and a point ahead of Y.M.C.A. These two clubs were our remaining opponents before the halfway point in the season was reached.

We knew our trip to Halton would be our hardest fixture so far, and so it turned out. There could have been no more difficult a debut for 16-year-old Stephen Towers, yet he did as well as anybody. He lost! We all lost! Our 25 match (W24 D1) unbeaten run was ended in no uncertain manner. Gordon's loss ended his 17-game unbeaten run (W15 D2) and was only his second defeat in 23 first team games.

We had just eight days in which to recover our equilibrium before entertaining Y.M.C.A.. That the teams were evenly matched was proved by four of the games being hard-fought draws. Ian recovered from his three losses in four games to score our only win and this made up for our one loss. We were accustomed to Gordon's sacrifices but not to the extent of a rook in the opening. We just kept our unbeaten home record. The leading positions at this point in the season were:

These three clubs had pulled away from the others.

We began 1975 with three good wins :- 5-1 v Frodsham, 5-1 v Daresbury in the cup quarter-final and 4½-1½ against y.M.C.A. B. Halton A

Matched our two league victories, but y.M.C.A. 'A' were beginning to falter. Our home fixture against Halton 'B' appeared a mere formality. We had beaten them easily away and were at full-strength for the return. After half-an-hours play we were one up and all seemed to be going well. By the end of the evening we were trailing 2-3 and looking desperately to Ian to square the match, which he did. With only five matches to go we were now three points behind Halton 'A' who also had the better games average.

For our semi-final at Frodsham we kept the same team although held on the top three boards, our strength-in-depth saw us through 41-11 as Peter, Gordon and Ian all won as did Dr Perkins. Our only loser was Alan - his third loss of the season to Frodsham. By his win Dr J P equalled Gordon's record of 17 games without defeat.

By a 4-2 win at Irlam and a 5-1 home success against Daresbury we kept alive our slim championship hopes. Halton 'A' were still winning so we remained three points adrift with only three to play. By beating Bailey of Daresbury, Dr Perkins extended his unbeaten sequence. Whilst we scored a convincing 5-1 win at Railway, Halton struggled to a draw against Y.M.C.A. B' two points behind with two to play... the next fixture brought Halton to Culcheth.

The fears of Richard and Peter proved justified, but Gordon and our three schoolboys (Alan, Jan, Jonathan) did us proud. Quite late on, the score was 2-2 with Jonathan having only a slight edge and Alan definitely on the losing end of his game against Rathbone. At the critical moment (about ten minutes to eleven) the younger brain proved to be the more alert to the swindling possibilities and Alan won. With Jonathan winning in more conventional style we triumphed by 4-2.
