Season Three 1975-76

The season opened with the club again confident that the First Team had a good chance of retaining its hold on the League Championship, that the Second Team would give a good account of itself in Division 2 and that a new Third Team would give Division 4 match experience mainly to new members and junior players. The new Peninsula Cup handicapping would make it more difficult for the Division 1 teams since a Division 2 team would receive 2f points start, a Division 3 team 3½ points start and a Division 4 team 4½ points start when meeting a Division 1 team!

The club had five players listed in the "Top Twenty" of the Warrington League Grading List. They were: - 188 Dr J Perkins 3rd, 161 Alan Mackenzie 11th, Gordon Brownbill 156 15th, 155 Peter Clemens and Richard Furness 16th=. Other graded players were Ian Durton 140, Jonathan Leigh 126, S Towers 112, W D Harper 102 and E Grimshaw 79.

First Team

Apart from the possible non-availability of Ian Dutton (now attending Salford University), the previous year's championship and cup-winning ham was still intact. Jonathan Leigh and new member David Smith were two other players obviously of first team standard. The only new team in Division I was Atherton (Division 2 winners the previous season) who had been considerably strengthened by the acquisition of two strong players from Bolton and Wigan Chess Clubs. The Daresbury club had closed and Y.M.C.A. 'B' had been relegated. The old Rawlway and Y.M.C.A. clubs were now called Orford Park and Warrington respectively. Halton, Atherton and Warrington were looked upon as our most dangerous opponents.

For the third successive season our campaign opened with a cup encounter with Allied Breweries who received 3½ points start. After our anxious time the previous year we took no chances, put out our strongest team, and won by 6-0. The league fixtures began with a visit to Atherton, where we squandered a 2-0 lead and lost by 4-2. After this setback, and with the knowledge from the previous season of how valuable a good game points total was, we set out to redeem our unfortunate start. A 4½-1½ victory against Orford Park was a welcome return to winning ways. Our three teenagers all won; Alan beat Pimblett, Jonathan was particularly severe on Johnson and Stephen Towers scored his first First Team victory by disposing of Burgess. Richard had his second successive loss.

Irlam gave us the usual difficult time. Jonathan soon came unstuck and Richard was on the edge of defeat for most of the evening. With Richard and Gordon both winning, Peter drawing and Alan and Jonathan losing, we ended the evening at 21-21. Dave Smith, on his Culcheth debut, had the deciding game. Upon resumption his opponent resigned without playing a move so we scraped through. We then went to Frodsham and dropped only two draws. Stephen notched his second win. The leading positions were:-

Our next match was against Halton $^{\circ}B^{\circ}$. Alan rounded-off his game with a mating attack following a Queen sacrifice. One-by-one all the other games came our way for a 6-0 victory.

We ended 1975 with a potentially difficult match at Warrington. The absence from our ranks of Dr Perkins was balanced by that of Parsonage - missing from the opposition. Alan was going well with an attack for his sacrificed pawn, but overlooked a time-saving check and was suddenly lost. With Peter getting a blocked position and Gordon scoring his fourth successive win, we ended the evening at $1\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$. We hoped the three unfinished games would give us at least a draw, but on resumption Richard, Jonathan and Stephen all won for a $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ victory. Stephen's mate with two bishops when a double exchange down was particularly satisfying.

Halton 'A' brought a team which was weaker than the 'B' team they had brought a few weeks earlier, but we only (!) managed to win by 5-1. Jonathan scored his fourth successive win and Richard and Ian their third. We had now completed half the league programme and the leading positions were:—

The Cup quarter-final at Orford Park enabled Richard to avenge one of his two losses by beating Bradshaw. Peter won when Pimblett resigned upon overlooking he did not need to lose a rook! It was 21-1 at the end of the session and 41-11 when all games had been completed.

Next came our return fixture with Atherton. If we could avoid defeat, and then not drop points against the weaker teams, the title would again be ours. We did just that with Richard and Alan being our winners, and Peter (ten games unbeaten) and Jonathan drawing. Gordon was having an overdose of Nigel Short, whilst Dr Perkins went down against O'Hara. Richards win - his fifth in succession - avenged his only other loss of the season.

The return league match with (Irford Park was won $(4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2})$ without difficulty and in the First Team's fiftieth match Irlam were crushed by 5-1. By beating Tully, Richard's winning sequence was extended to seven games. With Atherton still in hot pursuit we still could not afford to slip. The $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ win against Frodsham was closer than the score suggests. Peter's long unbeaten run (12 games) ended when he went down to O'Neill. Like the previous year we then had a hard time against Halton 'B', but emerged relatively unscathed for a 4-2 win.

For our Peninsula Cup semi-final against fourth division Tanner we were required to give a 4½ points start. We had to win by 5½-½ or better! With Gordon unable to play, 13-year-old Alan Beardsworth made his First Team debut. At the end of the evening we had won the only game to be completed and it was obvious that whilst we had chances, it would be very difficult to get the remaining points to overcome the handicap. Eventually we won 4½-1½ but after adding the handicap we lost by 4½-6. We had two league matches to play and the situation was now that we had to obtain two points from our final two fixtures to win the title on g superior games average.

Our match at home against Warrington was a very tense affair and the score stood at $2\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ in our favour when the evening ended. This match was still in the balance when we went to Halton 'A' for the final fixture. Although Ian and Jonathan both won, we went down $2\frac{1}{2}-3\frac{1}{2}$. Richard's thirteen-match unbeaten run ended.

By now Atherton had completed their programme and had won all their six fixtures since drawing with us at the start of the second half of the season. We had to turn that $2\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ situation against Varrington into a victory. Neither game was easy, with Richard's a very difficult one. Although a piece to the good his opponent had lots of mating threats. To avoid these all the material advantage would have to be returned and an awkward endgame would then result. As things turned out, Jonathan won his game to clinch the match and the title, whilst Richard's opponent failed to turn up on any of the dates suggested for the resumption so we won by $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ to retain the title by virtue of a superior game points score.

Once again our all-round strength had been decisive. All of the six regular members of the team obtained good percentages whilst none of the other four players lost a game.

Second Team

Fourteen membbers played for the team, but of these only four - Stephen Towers, Bill Harper (captain), Roger Williams and Mark Lyons - played in half of the fixtures. In most matches players with First Team experience were called upon to take the top two boards. The season began with a good win (4-2) against Halton 'D', but then came the first of three heavy defeats (sadly all 1-5) when against a much more experienced Orford Park 'B' we could salvage only two draws. Against Boteler we shared the points, with Alan Beardsworth and Jonathan Leigh getting good victories on the top boards. For the visit to Frodsham 'B' we included two debutants - Danny Henderson and Eric

Charters. The two teams were level 1½-1½ at adjournment. Within two minutes of resuming, Richard won thanks to a gross oversight on the part of his opponent, and two minutes later 13-year-old Mark Lyons won a piece and went on to register his first victory for the Second Team. The other game was agreed a draw, so we triumphed by 4-2. Warrington 'B' brought a powerful team. Draws on the top two boards were all we could get. It was a different story when we went to Parkside for the next fixture which brought a 4½-1½ win to take us to the halfway point in the season. With all teams having completed six matches the points gained were :- 9 Orford Park B; 7 Warrington B, Cuicheth B and Boteler; 6 Parkside; 4 Frodsham; 2 Halton D.

The return fistures began with a draw against Halton 'D' and a 4-2 home win against the leaders, Orford Park 'B', who defaulted on two boards. The final 5-1 reverse came at the hands of Boteler, but the team ended the season on a successful note by recording wins against Frodsham 'B' (5-1), Warrington 'B' (3\frac{1}{2}-2\frac{1}{2}) and Parkside (5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}). This late flourish brought the team up to second place, only a point behind the winners. The performance of Stephen Towers deserves a special mention. Playing in all the matches, he lost the first two, but then was unbeaten in the remaining ten, seven of which he won.

At the Annual General Meeting of August 1975 it was decided to take the ambitious step of forming a Third Team which would be entered in the Lowest division of the League (fourth). It was realised this would mean we had very few free club nights and that our resources (memberzhip) would be stretched. Roger Williams was elected as captain and we hoped to include as many juniors as possible for our home fixtures, with adult members playing more in the away matches. As things turned out, the team started badly and only one junior player retained his interest, so a number of new adult members were drafted into the team.

The programme began with a cup match at Parkside where our team received 3f points start. Both teams defaulted on the same board so — in a five—a-side match — we had to score only one point for victory. Mark Lyons soon got this point and the match was settled. We lost 1-4, but won 4f-4 with the handicap! Against Boteler Juniors our young team (average age about 12) crashed 5-1 with Adrian Roe our only winner. Another 5-1 defeat (Bill Harper the only winner) came when fitnerton 3rd visited, and the team went down again (4-2) at Padgate where Bill won again and Bernard Bray and Richard Baxter both drew. The cup match against First Division Orford Park was not as one-sided as the 0-6 (4f-6 with handicap) scoreline suggests. The shortest game lasted two hours and the longest three-and-a-half hours.

The visit to Appleton Thorn brought the long-awaited first victory (by 5-1) and wins for Messrs Williams, Bray, Grimshaw, Lowe and Charters. The team did well to lose by only a point against high-flying Tanner. Bernard Bray and Stephen Lowe both won and Mark Lyons drew. Mark was our only winner in the next match (against Boteler) but Roger and Bill drew. The season's best performance was probably the 3½-2½ victory over Atherton 3rd, but the season ended badly with losses against Fadgate, Rank Xerox (twice) and Tanner, and only a draw with fellow-strugglers Appleton Thorn. This left the team at the foot of the table, but despite the poor results, the "Third Team gamble" was a success. Without this team the new members would have had few opportunities of match play.

Mark Lyons was the most successful player. Missing only one match, he scored almost 50% in his first season of competitive play. Looking at the team as a whole, too many games were lost because of poor opening play which gave the opposition the initiative, and which gave our players difficult positions to defend. More accurate and more attacking opening play is needed. With more experience and confidence this should come.

Centre, The (Hyper-modern): the squares between KR1, KR8, QR1, QR8.

Checkmate: a self-inflicted torture by novices who do not know how to resign.

Chess: a simple game made difficult by your opponent.

Chess game : played in three parts unless you are beaten earlier.

Chess game, Opening: the part of the game where intelligence plays no part.

Chess game, Middle: the intelligent part in which material is exchanged and you end at least a pown down.
